He later was transferred to College Station where he directed research on disease control in honey bees, bee pollination of field and vegetable crops and methods

for raising queen honey bees. He retired in 1962 after 42 years of service with the Texas A&M University System. The family resides at 1008 Puryear here.

Alex was a veteran of World War I, a member of the Texas Beekeepers Association, and Our Saviors Lutheran Church.

Survivors include his wife, Adeline; a son, Leroy Alex of San Antonio; and a brother, Oscar Alex of Yorktown.
